#### The 46th Annual Jerome Fire Department Auxiliary Halloween Dance

Saturday, October 31 would have marked the 46th consecutive year that the Jerome Fire Department Auxiliary hosted the Halloween Dance and fundraiser. This annual dance is our largest running fundraising event for the year and typically accounts for 60 to 70 percent of our discretionary funding. We were unable to facilitate this year's event due to the COVID-19 virus. We hope by next year that life will be back to normal and we will be able to continue with this longtime-running, fun event that draws participants from all over the United States.

#### **New Jerome Fire Employee**

We are proud to announce that the duty officer position has been filled by Carl Whiting. He will be replacing Ian Haney who took a position with another agency. Carl has many certifications including FF I & II, EMT, Engine boss, and HAZMAT. We look forward to having his knowledge added to the department.

#### **FIRE DANGER STATUS**

- ⇒ The town of Jerome is in extreme fire danger. Any fire in our area would be extremely devastating to our community.
- ⇒ Most of the State of Arizona is in Stage One fire restrictions due to the lack of monsoon moisture and drought conditions this year.
- ⇒ The fire department had to close off the burn pile as it is extremely full. We will not be able to open it until we receive significant moisture to burn what's already in there.
- ⇒ Our brush truck has been deployed to 10 different fires around the state. The brush truck will have made over \$70,000 by the time it returns from this last deployment on 10-16-20.
- ⇒ This year fire season is expected to last well into December as we are into a weather phenomenon called La Niña, calling for a warm, dry, windy winter.
- ⇒ Please be mindful of extreme fire danger—the use of wood or charcoal barbecues is prohibited; use propane grills only.

Please remember that if you need assistance with Firewise activities, you must fill out a Firewise application and submit it to the Fire Department before work can be approved. Applications can be obtained at Town Hall or the fire station and are available on the Town of Jerome website.

#### YE OLDE BOOK ROOM

ecently, I had occasion to visit the Old Book Room for the first time in over seven months. As always, the shelves stood silent, ready to dispense adventure, history, romance, fantasy, mystery, etc. It made me wonder which book of the thousands sitting there was the one that could instantly generate the most reactions just by the mention of its title. Immediately in my mind, I heard the gulls cry, saw the ocean begin to boil, and watched the white whale breach.

Herman Melville was already a successful author when he wrote *MOBY-DICK* or *THE WHALE*, published in 1851. It was a commercial failure, received mixed reviews, and was out of print by the time he died in 1891. It was only in the early 20th century that *Moby Dick* resurfaced and began its climb to become what many believe to be the greatest American novel of them all. There isn't space here (or anywhere really) to list the impact and influence that Captain Ahab and the crew of The Pequod have had on cultures across the globe since then. You'll find universal themes within its pages: fate, free will, race,



madness, religion, fellowship, man vs. nature, and more details about life aboard a 19th-century whaleship than you can shake a harpoon at. There are countless homages, analyses, adaptations, films, sequels, debates, dissertations, punchlines and more ... As endless and deep as the sea itself.

Maybe *Moby Dick* isn't your cup of tea (or rum) and you may never have attempted to read it. Perhaps you tried and quit. The novel's size alone is intimidating—kind of like a whale. It may be that you have another book or books you consider far more influential and worthy of such high praise. However, I'm betting that by hearing the leviathan's name, it brought an image to mind and evoked a response.

In any case, I wish you success on your own voyage, pursuing your goals and dealing with the delights and demons that arise along the way. May I call you Ishmael?

#### Jerome Police Tips for Citizens

Recently the town has received several complaints of speeding and loud vehicles in town. I will address noise complaints first.

There have been six calls to police reporting noise complaints so far this year. Of these calls, five were for loud parties or people and one was for a loud generator on a job site. There have been no calls to our dispatch center reporting loud vehicles or noise from vehicles so far this year. This certainly does not mean we haven't taken action. So far this year, officers have issued five citations and 14 warnings to persons with excessive vehicle noise. Keep in mind that these incidents are often hard to enforce with a citation. Often there is a group of motorcycles coming through. The officer can hear someone in the group excessively revving their motor. The officer can't tell which of the bikers is the violator and ends up warning the group.

How can you help us with noise issues? If you hear loud vehicles and can see the offender, please call 911 and report it immediately. This is considered a crime in progress and warrants a 911 call. If possible, give the best description of the motorcycles, riders, or vehicles and last location spotted. We can't always catch violators; however, we frequently are able to locate and stop someone based on a citizen's report.

Speeding and reckless/aggressive driving are also frequent reports of concern. This is also an issue where we are not receiving calls when the violation occurs. If you are witnessing violations, please don't hesitate to call 911 and report the driving behavior. Please remember we need as good a description as you can give and last-known location of the vehicle. Officers have been very diligent in enforcement. We have made 317 stops of motorists so far for speeding this year. Of those, 205 have received citations and 112 have been warned. Additionally, we have hundreds of other stops for violations varying from passing in a no passing zone, stop signs, aggressive driving, reckless driving, and DUI.

We still need your help. Don't hesitate to call. This includes our local side streets. We have had a few complaints of speeding on Dundee Road, Gulch Road, and UVX Road. Often these complaints are about residents. If you are uncomfortable reporting a neighbor, please send or drop off an anonymous note to the police station letting us know who the violator is. Often we can change this behavior by a simple visit and discussion with the violator. See the numbers for reaching the police below:

**911** – In-progress event for immediate response.

928-634-8992 - Police Station. Use this for follow-up or reports of past events; usually this will be by leaving a message.

928-634-2245 - Police Dispatch/Non-Emergency. Use this to have an officer dispatched or pass information to an officer right away.

#### **History of the Jerome Historical Society**



For more than half a century, Jerome was a virtual ghost town. It wasn't until the formation of the Jerome Historical Society in 1953 and the opening of the Jerome Mine Museum that the town came alive.

When the mines closed in the 1950s, the population of Jerome dwindled to a handful of people. The historical society struggled to keep Jerome alive, trying to achieve their dream of making Jerome the "greatest outdoor museum." In 1956 the society completed negotiations with Phelps Dodge, assuring that no more buildings would be torn down in the main part of Ghost City. In addition, the society succeeded in purchasing most of uptown Jerome, securing Main Street. Today the Jerome Historical Society owns eight commercial buildings.

The balance of the buildings owned by the society were sold back to the community and persons interested in historic restoration
