

# From Councilmember Jane Moore: Let's talk about water rates

The fairness of water rates in town has been a topic of discussion for the past few years. The method Jerome has used for as long as I can remember has been a flat rate based on the type of account and the size of business or household. No one had expressed a problem with it until several years ago when a few people had issues with the seeming unfairness of this method, including town staff who were familiar with the rates and what folks were paying, and who had to tactfully ask how many people occupied a home.

The council has been looking into billing by usage rather than by flat rates and has brought in a firm who advises communities on establishing a rate structure to cover repair and maintenance, as well as save for needed improvements. Yes, other communities still use the flat rate system, but as water becomes a more precious resource every day, the town needs to be sure its methods are equitable while covering costs. This has been a difficult process in our unique town, and we want all our residents and business community to be aware that we are currently discussing this and would welcome input!

We are unusual in that our water comes from springs in a gravity-fed system rather than pumping it from an aquifer, so different issues surround our supply and delivery. If we are not using more than the springs' supply, we are sustainable, nor are we depleting an aguifer by pumping more than is replenished. Currently the council is considering a change in rate structure, starting with the commercial and out-of-town water hook-ups and may add residential accounts down the road. The minimum volume base charge being considered is for 8,000 gallons, then for each 1,000 gallons used, a graduated charge will be added to the flat rate, which will encourage conservation.



Our sewer rates are tied to water rates, and much of the water used certain times of year in residential areas is used for outdoor gardens and landscape rather than going into the sewer system. We have all seen the old photos of the mining days when the town was barren of vegetation and had endless problems with land subsidence and mudslides. We see the value of maintaining vegetation to hold soils in place, and we will be considering this issue as we move forward. The Jerome community needs to remember that our water system is also our fire suppression system and was originally built to fight the many fires that threatened the town in the past! We still have this threat to our historic town and have had fires in a few of our buildings that still lack sprinkler systems, so it is very important to all of us and historic preservation that we continue to maintain and improve our water system.

There is a lot to consider, and we hope you'll weigh in! The first public hearing to discuss our water rate structure will be at the September council meeting on Tuesday, September 14. We hope you'll join in the discussion or consider sending your input via email to town staff or a councilmember.

We will need your child's first name, age, and home street address. Books can be picked up at the library if preferred.


