

Jerome Fire Department would like to wish all of you a Happy New Year!



Fuel Abatement Team

Jerome Fire has been maintaining a three-man fuel abatement team who have reduced fuel loads throughout Jerome. They have made great progress. In its fifth year, this program has been funded by Yavapai County, State Forestry, Town of Jerome, and Wildland earnings from sending our brush truck out to fires around Arizona and California, which netted \$75,000 this year.

Jerome Fire would like to thank all the residents who have participated in fuel reduction on their properties. This makes it easier to protect your homes and our personnel in the event of a fire. Please do not throw your unwanted fuels onto someone else's property—we have the burn pile available to residents at UVX Road and Beale Street. If you need assistance with fuel removal or access to the burn pile, please contact Jerome Fire Department at 928-649-3034.



Annual Fire Extinguisher Service

The Jerome Fire Department in conjunction with Life & Property Safety are once again offering an inexpensive option for your annual fire extinguisher service. For a nominal fee of \$4.25 per fire extinguisher, a business or Jerome resident can have their fire extinguisher serviced. The service will be offered at the Jerome Fire Department on Wednesday, February 9 and Thursday February 10, 2022, 8 am until 5 pm. Take advantage of this generous service and know your fire extinguisher is in working order.

AREA CODE 928 PHONE NUMBERS TRANSITIONING TO 10-DIGIT DIALING

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has adopted 988 as the three-digit number to call the National Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Crisis Lifeline starting July 16, 2022.

For 988 to work in the 928, 480, 520 area codes, 10-digit local dialing is required.

According to the FCC, as of October 2021, you should be dialing 10 digits for local calls. If you attempt to make a local call without the 928 area code, you may get a recording letting you know the call cannot be completed.

If you've got equipment programmed with just the seven-digit number (e.g., autodial, contact info on your cell phone, alarm systems, etc.), you may want to update that information too.

Jerome Utilities—New in 2022

On November 9, 2021, Council adopted and approved Resolution 628, which established certain changes to our utility billing rates as of January 1, 2022. I am looking forward excitedly to the changes, and I wanted to share what is changing and who will be affected.

What rates are changing?

Water and sewer rates for commercial accounts are the only rates changing at this time.

How are the rates changing?

Previously, commercial accounts were billed based on occupancy, similarly to residential accounts. The new rates will be based on water/sewer usage. So, the amount of water that a business uses in a month will determine their monthly charges.

Who will be affected?

Only commercial accountholders will have a rate change. This includes retail businesses, galleries, restaurants, hotels, and multi-use buildings with one or more of any of these. It will also include buildings used for residential purposes with four or more individual units.

Who will not be affected?

Residential accountholders will not experience a rate change at this time. This includes single-family homes and multifamily buildings with three or fewer individual units. Businesses with trash-only accounts will not be affected either.

How are the charges calculated?

The new commercial rates have a base usage of 12,000 gallons per month. All commercial accounts will receive the base charge of \$58 for the first 12,000 gallons of water and \$72 for the first 12,000 gallons for sewer. If a business uses 12,000 gallons or less per month, they will ONLY receive these base charges for water/sewer. If a business uses more than 12,000 gallons, they will receive an additional charge for every 1,000 gallons above the base. The additional charge is \$3.25 per 1,000 gallons for water and \$4.50 per 1,000 gallons for sewer. TRASH RATES ARE NOT CHANGING.

Is there anything else we should know?

If you have an automatic payment set up with your financial institution, you may want to discontinue this or make changes soon. The new rates take effect in January, and the first billing statement showing new charges will be mailed in February.

This will be a big change for the Town and the members of our community, and we may encounter a few surprises along the way. As always, I can be reached at Town Hall for any issues. We thank you all for your patience and continued support.
