Jerome Humane Society

Jerome is a town that loves cats! And though cats can be very self-sufficient for the most part, as our pets, they do need care. Here are **Sixteen things you should never do to your cat,** adapted from PetsKB.

- 1. Fail to provide for its basic welfare. If you take in a cat, be a responsible owner.
- 2. Feed inappropriate food such as snacks and cheap kibble. JHS can advise you on the best food for your pets, and we provide help if needed.
- 3. Deprive your cat of attention. Even though they can seem aloof at times, cats are family and need to feel secure.
- 4. Correct by punishing. Like all sentient creatures, cats thrive and learn with positive reinforcement.
- 5. Skip the vet. Our pets need regular check ups and vaccinations to keep healthy and spot illnesses and conditions before the become big health problems.



6. Ignore warnings and boundaries. Cats need their space and they let you know it. Respect their wishes and co-exist in peace.

7. Assume you can't educate them. Cats are intelligent and they appreciate learning.

8. Neglect their grooming. Cats are great at grooming themselves but keep an eye out for mats, mites and too-long nails. Older cats, especially, can become matted if arthritis and pain keep them from reaching their nether regions.

- 9. Smoke. Never smoke around any living creature.
- **10. Scare them with loud noises.** Cats don't appreciate being startled any more than we do. **Don't leave balloons around like Sally did!**
 - **11. Shave for effect.** Sure, cute cuts can get attention but it can also make your cat feel weird. If your cat needs to cool off, find a good groomer to do the deed.
 - 12. Ridicule your cat for amusement. Don't tease your cat for a laugh. It's not funny.
 - 13. Declaw your cat. Declawing is basically amputation the nail and first joint of the paw. It's cruel and many vets rightly refuse to do it. Provide your cat with fun toys to scratch on.
 - 14. Abandon your cat if it's not the right fit. Take the time to

make your new pet comfy in your home. There are lots of websites dedicated to ensuring you're both happy. If you must rehome your cat, do it through networking and rescue organizations.

15. Treat your cat like a human. Cats are unique creatures who enjoy being felines.

Admire their characteristics and don't inhibit them.

16. Allow others to mistreat your cat. Children and people who don't know cats may inadvertently harm them. Protect your pets by setting ground rules for

interacting with them. **Jerome Humane Society exists to support and help care for your pets. Let's enjoy them all!**




Jerome Fire Department would like wish all of you a Happy New Year!

We are coming to the end of another year with Jerome fire Department reaching 471 calls as of December 31, 2022, and about 80 other events such as Meetings, Trainings, Rope Rescue Trainings and Work Sessions. Jerome Fire Department has progressively become busier each year, demanding more and more from its personnel. Some of these calls can be very stressful and dangerous for personnel. More so these past few years than any other years with the chance of exposure to the virus. I would like to take this time to thank all the Jerome Fire Department's personnel, who have taken the time out of their lives, to go to College for EMT, Firefighter certifications and those who attended other trainings such Rope Rescue, Wildland and many more trainings, so they can help you on your worst day. I would also like to thank all those who show up to our regular training and those who respond to calls day or night 24/7.

In addition, Jerome Fire has been maintaining a 3-man fuel abatement team, reducing fuel loads throughout Jerome. This program is vital, and we have made great progress. This program has been funded thanks to grants provided by Yavapai County Firewise, Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire Management, Town of Jerome, and Wildland money earned by sending our Brush Truck out to fires in Texas and New Mexico which netted \$75,000 this year.

Jerome Fire would like to thank all the residents who have also participated in fuel reduction on their properties, this helps us maintain the town's national recognition of being a Firewise community. The Jerome Fire Department offers free Firewise home assessments to all residents, this assessment will provide you with the necessary information to help us protect your home and our personnel in the event of a fire.

Please remember not to throw your unwanted fuels onto someone else's property, we have the burn pile available to residents at UVX Rd. and Beale Street. If you do need assistance with fuel removal, or access to the burn pile, please contact Jerome Fire Department at 649-3034.

If you are or know of anyone interested in becoming a firefighter please contact us, we are always in need of volunteers as well as paid fuels crew members. We offer many in-house trainings as well as assistance with many other different educational opportunities.



Annual Fire Extinguisher Service

The Jerome Fire Department in conjunction with Life & Property Safety are again offering an inexpensive option for your annual fire extinguisher service. For a nominal fee of \$5.00 per fire extinguisher, a business or Jerome resident can have their fire extinguisher serviced. The service will be offered at the Jerome Fire Department on February 8th and 9th 2023, beginning at 8am until 4 pm.

For the businesses around town just know that you need to now bring your fire extinguishers up to the fire station to receive the 5 dollar per extinguisher price. Otherwise, if the company must come to you there will be an additional cost per fire extinguisher.


