EXCITING NEWS-

The recent addition of a new Town shuttle has allowed the old Town shuttle van to finally be retired after providing years of service to the residents and visitors of Jerome.

The Town was able to purchase a new 2023 Ford Transit 350 shuttle last month based on years of prudent budget practices and contributions from the Yavapai-Apache Nation through Proposition 202 funding. The new Town shuttle has enhanced safety features and will provide a more smooth and comfortable ride throughout Town. It also has added cargo space for assisting users with their various packages.

As a reminder the Shuttle runs Friday mornings from 11 AM to 4 PM, Saturdays & Sundays from 11 AM to 6 PM, and also offers service on some major holidays!

For our local residents, we are still running the Wednesday morning ride into Cottonwood. Meet the Shuttle at 600 Clark Street (Town Hall) at 9 AM, or call ahead if you need to be picked up along the normal route.

As always, please call **928-821-0133** if you need to utilize the Town shuttle on days it is in operation.

Prescott National Forest Outlook/Conditions

This winter we have received an abundance of much needed moisture as we all know. The good news is that we are not in drought conditions. Also, it is predicted that we will have a normal Wildland fire season this year instead of the extreme that we have become accustomed to. As we can see the green up is above average and the grass and weeds are in abundance.

As we enter spring, we are seeing the temperatures rise as well as the wind. With this combination the grass and other fuels dry out quickly creating a wildland fire hazard. Please clear an area of at least ten feet around the perimeter of your house of any grass, weeds or any other fuels that will put your house at risk!

We would also like to remind Jerome residents to be extra cautious with barbecues, weed eating, smoking or any other activity that has the potential of creating sparks. Always keep water close by when doing any of these activities.

If you need help with the weeds or other hazardous fuel removal you can come to the fire station and fill out a Firewise request form.

If you do need to report a fire, remember to Call 911.

Keep an eye on the bulletin board at the post office and other posting places and our social media for any updates on fire conditions or restrictions.

Snake season is here!

As we begin to warm up, we will start seeing snakes again. Remember some of the snakes are good to have around. King snakes will eat the Rattlesnakes and Bull snakes keep the rodent population down. Both are not a threat to humans.

Here is some information on Rattlesnakes.

Most bites occur between the months of April and October when snakes and humans are most active outdoors. About 25 percent of the bites are "dry," meaning no venom was injected, but the bites still require medical treatment. Depending on weather and threatening conditions such wildfires, rattlesnakes may roam at any time of the day or night. If walking at night, be sure to use a flashlight. To avoid rattlesnake bites some safety precautions will help:

• Wear appropriate over-the-ankle hiking boots, thick socks, and loose-fitting long pants. Never go barefoot or wear sandals when walking through wild areas.

- When hiking, stick to well-used trails.
- Avoid tall grass, weeds, and heavy underbrush where snakes may hide during the day.
- · Look at your feet to watch where you step and do not put your foot in or near a crevice where you cannot see.
- · Do not step or put your hands where you cannot see and avoid wandering around in the dark.
- · If a fallen tree or large rock is in your path, step up on to it instead of over it, as there might be a snake on the other side.
- Be especially careful when climbing rocks or gathering firewood.
- Check out stumps or logs before sitting down and shake out sleeping bags before use.

• Do not turn over rocks or logs. If you must move a rock or log, use gloves, and roll it toward you, giving anything beneath it the opportunity to escape in the opposite direction.

- Never grab "sticks" or "branches" while swimming in lakes and rivers. Rattlesnakes can swim.
- · Avoid approaching any snake you cannot positively identify as a safe species.

• If you hear the warning rattle, move away from the area, and do not make sudden or threatening movements in the direction of the snake.

- Remember rattlesnakes do not always rattle before they strike!
- · Do not handle a freshly killed snake it can still inject venom.

We would like to remind everyone to be careful when out in the yard.

If you find a snake, remember to keep a safe distance, note its location, and Call 911. The Fire department will respond and relocate the snake to a safe location away from town.

If your dog is free-roaming on walks or if your property is known to have rattlers, sign your dogs up for rattlesnake avoidance classes. Graduates of the classes clearly go well out of their way to avoid snakes. It's a good clue for walkers too, giving you a heads up that 11 something scaly lurks ahead! 111 10 10 Ш

Finally we come to the most overarching danger of Summer - HEAT. Keep your



pets safe from burned feet by walking them early or late in the day and never in the midday sun. Also, as a tourist town dweller, be on the alert for pets or children locked in cars. If you observe a pet or child in danger in a hot car call Jerome PD Dispatch at 928-634-2245. If the pet needs our help, the police will contact us.

We replaced the light in the shaft at the Audrey headframe down at the Douglas Mansion. JHS constructed and maintains this exhibit. The old incandescent light was replaced with a bright LED. This bright light lets you see at least a couple hundred feet down the shaft.

The concrete-lined Audrey shaft is 1900 feet deep but is filled with water up to the natural water level of 1300 feet. Throughout 20 years of mining operation pumps were running at all times to keep the tunnels from flooding.

The Audrey shaft is connected to the Josephine tunnel which emerges in Clarkdale near the Indian reservation. The ore from the Little Daisy Mine was transported from there by train to Clemenceau (now Cottonwood) for smelting. You can still see the slag pile in Cottonwood.

Here is a reminder that 2023's annual extra trash pick-up will start Monday, May 1st. Jerome's Public Works Department will do a one-time per household, single bulk item removal. This means you can put that torn-up recliner or broken vacuum cleaner out with your regular trash and the town crew will whisk it away for you.

Items town crew will **NOT** pick up:

hazardous waste Ø contaminated soil Ø tires Ø large drums Ø medical waste Ø wet paint asbestos Ø batteries Ø railroad ties Ø fluorescent light bulbs Ø television sets

If your regular trash is picked up on <u>Fridays</u>, then that's the day to set out your extra pick-up. If you are on the <u>Monday</u> route, same drill.

Public Works will run this special service through the month of May OR UNTIL THE DUMPSTER IS



FULL! Please keep in mind we are talking about single bulk items, don't empty your whole garage! Not sure of what can or cannot be picked up? Call us at town hall: 928-634-7943.

One more thing: Please bag your trash and be mindful of the weight of your regular cans. The town code limit is 40 pounds max—let's spare the crew's backs. Thank you!
